The community expresses that whatever shelters and property that have survived from destruction are now occupied by others and with the collapse of the administration system, documents related to land tenure and title deed might have been destroyed or lost.

The recommendations are derived from the conditions stated above. In kind distribution of shelter materials is recommended to ensure that shelters are well covered and secured before the impending rain to prevent inhabitants from effects of the weather and the NFIs are intended to be distributed to PSNs who require more material support due to their vulnerability and capacity to cope up with the effects of weather. Though the prediction of a prolong rain this year has an subsequent effect on the IDPs.

Apparently, our targets are extracted from the CCCM's CRM desk and referrals from protection department. Subsequent, assessments were conducted to verify condition of the shelters and the associated need. The
